




Ratio of Female to Male Earnings




Female to Male Earnings Ratio




Females Living in Poverty by Race-Ethnicity




People Living in Poverty by Sex




Seniors Living in Poverty by Sex

Black Maternal & Infant Health Crisis



Research has revealed alarming numbers and disparities in health in Black women from the county.

Mortality

Maternal death has increased from 13.2 per 100,000 live births in 2006 to 29.7 per 100,000 live births in 2019

Rates

Maternal mortality is ~25% higher than national average

Maternal mortality is ~54% **higher** than State average

(National Center for Health Statistics, 2022; New York State Prevention Agenda Dashboard County Level: Monroe County, 2022)

Morbidity

Morbidity is 50% higher in Black women than White women

(Common Ground Health, 2021, p34)



Infant Mortality

There are 7.1 infant deaths per 1,000 live births. Black infants 3x more likely to die than White infants

ROC2025 - Benchmarking Peer Group

Example - Pandemic Recovery Rate

The region's job base expanded by 18,800 in the 12-month period ending March 2022. The annual growth rate of 3/8% outperformed the peer group average and ranked 20th in the 53-metro benchmark group.




Prioritizing the Change You Want to See -- and Make

- Mounting special efforts to help Blacks and other minorities who have been adversely impacted by past discrimination get ahead
- Establishing new schools with specialized curricula that would be open to both suburban and urban students
- Creating more affordable housing in the suburbs
- A jobs program that would encourage employers to hire those in poverty
- > Ensuring local minority-owned businesses have access to more loans

- Directing funding to benefit neighborhoods that house groups that have been adversely affected by discriminatory policies
- Increasing instruction in public schools on the history of discrimination in Monroe County
- ▶ Enabling more diverse neighborhoods in Monroe County
- Addressing discriminatory biases within our healthcare system that were revealed by the pandemic
